

# LOCAL HISTORY

#### FORMER METHODIST CHAPEL FRONT STREET

Just after midnight on the 31st October 1902 Luke White, Member of Parliament for Middleton, rushed from the House of Commons to the village to be present at the opening ceremony of the new Methodist Chapel which was performed later in the day by the wife of the Reverend J. Elsworth, secretary of the Hull district, using a silver key.

Mr White had been present in the Commons when the important and highly



contentious bill dealing with secondary education was being discussed which had among other concerns to satisfy the competing claims of religious groups.

When he spoke to the assembled audience in the new chapel Mr White was ahead of his time in looking forward to the provision by Parliament of a secular system of

instruction that would enable a child to rise from the elementary class to the university.

Later the Reverend S Chadwick held the audience spellbound while he talked about the Methodist Church's place in history. In fact the two branches of Methodism were established in the village, the Wesleyan to which the new chapel belonged in 1809 and the Primitive in 1821. On the 30th March 1851 a once only national religious census took place revealing that the total attendance at worship in Middleton that day for the Methodists was 189 compared with 125 for the Anglicans.

The Parish Rector Mr Blanchard had been well disposed towards two evangelists who visited the village in 1881 as he thought they could perhaps reach those in the community who had resisted his own best efforts. His curate however who walked about the village "as though he were peer and pope combined" was less helpful. The Rector later dismissed the curate.

The Driffield Times reporter present at the ceremony described the building itself as being in the Renaissance style from a design by Gelder and Kitchen of Hull with the construction carried out by G T Eastwood of Middleton at a cost of £615.5s.6d. The site on Garth Hill was given by Lord Londesborough and among the subscriptions was one of £10 from Colonel Brooksbank of Middleton Hall.

The new building replaced the one erected in Chapel Lane in 1809 which was eventually bought by Mr A Dooks in 1904 for £55 and subsequently used as a dwelling. An earlier tender for the property had alarmed the trustees who thought that the would be purchaser intended to use it as a dancing room.

The Front Street chapel ceased to operate after the Harvest Festival in September 2015 and has been converted to a private dwelling.

Methodist services are now held at the Wolds Methodist Church at Bainton and in joint worship at St Andrews Church in Middleton.

## A NOTE FROM YOUR ASSISTANT PRIEST



#### COLLABORATIVE MINISTRY

As we start 2019, Woldsburn Benefice is looking forward in eager anticipation to our new Vicar, being licensed by Bishop Alison on Wednesday March 20 in Bainton Church at 7.30 pm. As we look forward to this welcome

event, we also look backward to how we have worked together over the last few difficult years.

One of the key phrases I heard during my Ordination Training 20 years ago was "collaborative ministry". This is what we have been doing in Woldsburn and Waggoners Benefices over this difficult time. We have relied on each other and we have relied upon God. In this, we have followed the call of Jesus, that we should work together in love to serve our churches and our communities.

John tells of the new commandment that Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper, and the commandment that Jesus gives to us now: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another as I have loved you. By this all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John13 v 34) As we attempt in all we do to follow this commandment, we act as servants to each other, in Church, in our family and in our community, again following our Lord Jesus: "if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. <sup>15</sup>For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you." (John 13 v 14)

Paul takes up this teaching of Jesus and calls us "co-workers in God's service" (I Corinthians 2 v 9) and in Ephesians we find "<sup>21</sup>In Christ Jesus the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; <sup>22</sup>in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling-place for God." (2 v 22)

Wow! This is what we are all called to do and to be in our Christian life together - loved by God and so loving others; served by Jesus our Lord and so serving others; built up as God's house, providing shelter for those who are lonely, bereaved or grieving. This is what collaborative ministry means for us in our part of East Yorkshire: we have been trying to practise this. At the start of this new year, as we look towards our new Vicar coming, we

offer to God this collaborative ministry. Over the years we have been learning how to work together and we pledge ourselves to continue as this new year unfolds.

Let our New Year prayer be:

Bind us together, Lord, bind us together with cords that cannot be broken Bind us together, Lord, bind us together, bind us together in Love

At the last meeting, on December 3rd, the Council voted to oppose the proposed selling of the Reading Rooms whilst asking for more information on maintenance and usage. The Council will then assess options and perhaps put forward a rescue package.

The Council is obtaining quotes for several projects including replacing the embankment steps on Warter Road and repairing the footpath between Orchard Drive and Greenfield Road.

# MIDDLETON BOWLS CLUB

Middleton on the Wolds Bowls Club is situated on the Market Weighton road, just before the allotments and playing fields. We consist of an Outdoor Club, which can be seen from the public footpath, and a full size



two rink Indoor Club, at the rear of the Outdoor clubhouse.

The Outdoor Club operates from April until September, and the Indoor Club from September until April. Membership in either the Outdoor or Indoor sections is open to anyone. Membership

is not essential for Social bowling, but different costs apply. We give tuition to beginners, operate four Outdoor teams in local Leagues, and self-operate three Indoor Leagues. The Outdoor teams play Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evenings, and two teams on Wednesday afternoons. The Indoor Leagues play Triples teams on Wednesday and Friday afternoons; Aussie Pairs on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons; and the Evening Pairs teams on a Monday and Wednesday evenings. Social bowling is available for anyone on most mornings and at a weekend.

The League tables for the Indoor Leagues appear weekly in the Sports section of the Driffield and Wolds Weekly newspaper.

We are a self-supporting Club, relying mainly on subscriptions and match fees for finances, but also with sponsorship from two local firms.

#### "The Glassblower" by Petra Durst Benning

Set in late 19<sup>th</sup> century Germany in a small village where the main occupation is making small glass items from glass eyes to Christmas baubles, the Glassblower tells the story of 3 daughters after their father and breadwinner dies suddenly. As the story progresses they each find their own niche and realise that they can make their way in a male-dominated industry. The book explores how life was for people in the humble dwellings and, of course, there is also a fair element of romance involved.



At first the translation (unfortunately into American English) seems a little stilted but either it improves as the book goes on or you get so wrapped up in the story that you stop noticing. Most enjoyed the book and a few, including me, intend to move onto the next book in the trilogy.

# LOCAL BIRDS & WILDLIFE

I've been late putting the bird feeders out this year, but it has only taken a week for most of our usual visitors to return. including a Greenfinch so hopefully their numbers are picking up since the catastrophic decline due to Trichomonosis in 2005-2007. I've normally only had one or two at a time visiting, so it would be



interesting to know if anyone else sees them in larger numbers. With the extra activity in the garden we've had the first Sparrowhawk visit since early spring; just a fleeting glimpse. One friend was lucky enough to watch one perched on her fence on Greenfield Road for several minutes, while another, on South Street, watched one on a pole - she was glad she wasn't too close to it as before flying off it did a most spectacular poo which extended a surprising distance from the bird!

I was really pleased to receive a short video of a female Greater Spotted Woodpecker in a garden on Orchard Drive; apparently it's been visiting regularly and was with a juvenile in summer. The same person also saw a badger just outside the village!

Lastly, does anyone else think that there are suddenly more magpies about in the surrounding countryside than there have been for some time? I wonder if we get migrants from Europe, like we do with blackbirds and robins (as well as the winter thrushes) - I'll try and find out!

NHS East Riding of Yorkshire Clinical Commissioning Group has arranged with local family doctor practices to make it easier for people to access routine care. Extra appointments are now available in the evenings, at weekends and on bank holidays from more than a dozen convenient locations in the East Riding. The Improving Access service is an extension of your GP practice and offers pre-bookable appointments with GPs, nurses, healthcare assistants, physiotherapists, pharmacists and mental health workers.

This is not a walk-in service – you do need to book an appointment in the normal way through your own GP practice.
