A NOTE FROM YOUR VICAR

How conkers helped with the war effort

Do you remember playing conkers as a child?

Which was your preferred method to make them hard - baking them, soaking them in vinegar or varnishing them? Or maybe you had your own secret method.



Many years ago when people saw the first conker on the ground they would say, 'oddly, oddly onker, my first conker' and they believed that saying this little rhyme would give them good luck during autumn.

Chestnut trees have been grown by humans for a very long time -2000 years before Jesus was born. They were planted all over Europe by the armies of Alexander the Great and later by the Romans.

They are sometimes called Horse Chestnuts, one reason being if you look at the twigs you can see little horse shoe marks which look like a tiny horse has trotted along them – it is really where the leaves fell off last year.

But did you know that during the First World War conkers were very important in the war effort. This notice appeared in class rooms and scout huts all over Britain:

Groups of scholars and boy scouts are being organised to collect conkers...

This collection is invaluable to war work and is very urgent.

Please encourage it.

The children were never told exactly how conkers could help the war effort but they were probably more interested in the money they made by collecting them. They received 7s6d (37 ½ p) for every 100 weight. For weeks they searched the woods and lanes and collected more conkers than the trains could carry – piles of them were left rotting in railway stations. But three thousand tons were sent to Kings Lynn, Norfolk where they were used to make acetone which was used to fire shells and bullets. Until then they had used wood but it took 100 tons of wood to make just 1 ton of acetone – they also used grain and potatoes but they were needed for food. It was the chemist Chaim Weizman who came up with the idea of using chestnuts because they are high in starch and there were millions of them all over Britain. So a little chestnut and many children helped in the war effort.

LOCAL BIRDS & WILDLIFE

A definite feel of Autumn now; rain (and more rain), the leaves just starting to fall but unfortunately the lawn is still growing merrily. The birds are appearing in larger numbers in the garden again now – they tend to lurk around in the undergrowth when they are renewing their feathers which have become battered and worn with the busy summer of breeding and feeding their young. Suddenly there are five blackbirds pottering about on the lawn, and dunnocks, sparrows and a variety of tits appearing. The wood pigeons, needless to say, don't take any time off through the year and the males are still sidling seductively up to the females and nest-building never seems to stop.

Pat got in touch to report two lots of geese flying over (and since then I have seen a large skein over our house) and she says "Hearing owls regularly — outside the Village Hall and we did have two owls a the top end of The Paddocks calling to each other. Great to see them." The garden birds also did not disappoint: "Just had a huge flock of long-tailed tits fly in. Didn't stay unfortunately. Quickly in and out. What a thrill — haven't seen any for a while."



Pat and also Alison identified my mystery butterfly from last month – it is a Small Copper. Incidentally Alison is wondering if there are enough interested people to start a little wildlife group meeting once a month, to try



to make Middleton wildlife friendly. I will be happy to pass your details on to her if you contact me.

Finally an exciting (though brief) moment for us when a Merlin flew low over the road near Burnby just in front of our car! They do overwinter in the East of England, so it is worth looking out for a bird like a small kestrel hunting fast and low over open ground with a strong rapid wingbeat.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At our meeting on the 7th October, we welcomed our Ward Councillor Mr Kevin Beaumont, and we discussed various issues including the wide load vehicles coming through the village, and resident parking in the village.

Our concern is that wide load vehicles are passing through our village transporting modular buildings. The road has been blocked on several occasions and damage has been caused to road signs etc at both ends of the village. It was suggested that if we had photographic evidence we should forward this to Councillor Beaumont in order that the authority could talk to the transport company, to see if a more appropriate route could be taken or our concerns addressed in another way. I hope that we can also engage with the company and discuss our concerns.

It was also good to welcome a member of the public to our meeting, and discuss various issues / points of concern; one of which was whether the village had ever been involved with the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. This was considered many years ago however unfortunately the end goal was never achieved mainly due to lack of support from enough people at the time. The Parish Council consider that joining the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme would be good for the village, and will try to arrange an open meeting to discuss the advantages of joining the scheme in the near future. Middleton could be a safer village if we joined such a scheme, but we need to work together and share the same objectives.

As mentioned in previous issues of the newsletter we would welcome any suggestions as to what the village could do to celebrate VE Day 75. We had a number of good suggestions from one resident; however we would encourage others to make suggestions and we would welcome offers of support to help with arranging such an event.

Several people have expressed an interest in joining a Speed Watch Group if one can be set up. I guess we are all tired of speeding traffic through our village and volunteers want to help to make our roads safer. It's a great idea and we hope such a group can be set up soon .

LOCAL HISTORY

MANOR FARM

Many people in the village may wonder what was on the site of the new houses and behind remaining parts of the walls around the present Robin Hood car park. This was the long demolished Manor House Farm. An 1856 history states "The Manor House is a small ancient building in the village and there is an ancient farm house, near the church, now the residence of Mr Robert



Railton, the walls of which are three feet in thickness and from foundations discovered around both of these houses they are supposed to occupy the sites of large mansions". A little confusing perhaps.

The Manor House is also referred to in the archives as the venue for meetings of the Great Court Leet, a body which dealt with minor agricultural matters from 1704-1899 under the authority of the Lords of Londesborough, the Lords of the manor. During the second world war it was useful for the Air Raid Precautions committee (ARP) and the Parish Council meetings.

Another name with various spellings closely associated with Manor Farm was the Witty family who were said to have been descended from a common ancestor Roger Whytter, a wool merchant who fled from Flanders to Beverley in 1275. There have been several distinguished members of the family including a Doctor Robert Witty who helped to promote Scarborough as a spa in the 17th century and the names of other members are scattered across the centuries in the various records for Middleton. One that particularly stands out is that of Phillip Wittie, husbandman, who was in 1645 fined £14 with other penalties by the sequestration committee of the East Riding, his offence - assisting the enemy when Charles the First's Catholic Queen Henrietta Maria landed at Bridlington during the Civil War by enabling Royalist forces to seize goods from the Parliament side. In his defence Phillip claimed he had been the victim of force by the King's army, but the fine was paid.

These were turbulent times and the village was supposed to give its support to the Royalist cause - Charles had extended the imposition of Ship Money to inland places and the rate for Middleton was £12 required for the building of two ships each of 480 tons.

Phillip's name, together with 11 other Middleton men, appeared on a Muster roll in 1636. These were able bodied men aged 16 to 60 liable for military service armed with their own weapons and armour according to their income and loyal to the Crown. The onset of the Civil War however meant that such loyalties were subject to change as with the famous refusal by Sir John Hotham of the King's entry into Hull on 23 April 1642.

In 1935 the Driffield Times carried a report on the final departure of the family from the village when Mr & Mrs Charles Harold Witty left to take up residence at Park Farm, Barthorpe severing a connection of nearly three hundred years.

One of the things that was particularly missed when the Manor Farm site was cleared was the pond in the corner which certain residents believed was helpful in reducing the flooding that at one time plagued South Street.



She also has the unenviable task of looking after the wool store and knowing exactly where every one of the 100+ colours is and how much of each we have. She is married to our workshop manager Prem and has a son called Prashant.

When Sita married Prem and came to our workshops she used to ao sunbathing on the roof. After a while, about 12 years ago, she was given the job of office cleaner and then slowly she was trained up to use the knitting machines, which up until then had been a male only job. After that other ladies were trained to use the machines and now all of our machine operators are ladies. Sita, Prem and Prashant live in a small house on the workshop and store site and Sita is also the 'Keeper of the Keys', so it is poor Sita who has to come and open the doors for me when I want to get into the workshops at all sorts of strange hours of the day and night. Black Yak pays for Prashant to go to a private school near the workshops and I have a feeling that his smart red jacket was not his first choice of clothing for this family photo.
