Well, the Middleton Brambling made a final bow just after the last Newsletter deadline but on the same day in our garden an Orange-tip Butterfly appeared, so it really was spring after all. The following day our previous Brambling correspondent reported two Marsh Tits in their garden (following an enviously Bittern-filled visit to Minsmere, some people have all the luck!)



We saw our first House Martins hunting for insects overhead on 20th April, but they must have been passing through as we didn't see any more until 12th May, when at last there seemed to be a small group circling overhead late in the day, and as we watched some swifts appeared, silently hunting. Heard their first calls the following day, an excitingly summery sound!

Another blackcap was reported in a garden on Front Street, where there was the extra bonus of a pair of Pied Wagtails enjoying the bird bath. "We also get daily morning visits from a male Pheasant, obviously looking for an easy breakfast!"



We were lucky enough to have a first-ever sighting in our garden - a Moorhen! It spent all day every day (except when someone left the house, when it faded into the background, re-appearing as soon as the coast was clear) for a week and a day, then hasn't been seen since. The visit started a day or two after I saw new Ducklings on the Village Green, so I wonder if the Moorhen decided to stay out of the way for the first week of disrupted nights, nappy changes, the parent Ducks trying to show it videos of the hatchings.....





LOCAL HISTORY

LIVING AND WORKING AT THE HALL

The 1881 census reveals that in its Victorian heyday Colonel Brooksbank employed a governess, lady's maid, cook, housemaid, kitchen maid, nursemaid, footman and groom at the Hall but we have no secret revealing diaries in the "Downton" manner by any of them.

For a picture of life in the Hall at the beginning of the Second World War we have to thank Mrs Winnie Cook and when my wife and I went to see her in Driffield some years ago she was very pleased to share her reminiscences of working happily for the Prince Smith family the last resident owners of the property which appeared in her book "My Story - Winnie Cook."



Arriving at the Hall Winnie met Miss McKeller, the housekeeper, and chose to be a kitchen maid as she liked food. Miss McKeller, who was to become a lifelong friend, was fussy and strict but she knew her job so Winnie learnt a lot and it proved to be the easiest work she ever had. As a bonus Lady Prince Smith allowed her to practise on the Hall piano which was better than the one Winnie used at home.

Winnie joined the Girl Guides who met at the Hall, did tracking through the woods, learned about flags and knots, attended Sunday parades followed by church services which were joined by

servicemen stationed nearby. She also learned First Aid and was on call in an emergency, but luckily no bombs were dropped nearby.

Miss McKeller could be hospitable and entertained lady teachers and Winnie's family members including her granny and father, who as he liked gardening, was shown round the greenhouses which were full of peaches, grapes and tomatoes. There was also plenty of food from the Southburn farm and game in the cellar in the shooting season although Miss McKeller could make a meal out of scraps and did not always need grand ingredients.

When the Prince Smith family was in attendance the three regular staff had village help but once everything was "cleaned and shipshape" everywhere was a picture but as the war progressed things changed with the influx of evacuees.

Winnie stated that "There were two wings: north and south, the south wing was used by the nurse and governesses, in the north wing was a huge airing room, a bedroom used by an evacuee school teacher, Mr Dakin from Hull, and two bathrooms. Above that were some stairs and the sleeping quarters for about thirty evacuees. The long stretch of floor on both wings took some scrubbing, at least two days work".

The whole top floor was occupied by boys' beds . The Billiard Room acted as dining hall, the food was cooked in what was originally the scullery. Two full-time village ladies cared for and fed them. After about six months a younger girl came and was put in the kitchen, so Winnie became a parlourmaid and wore a blue silk dress and white apron with big wide strings to tie in a big bow at the back.

She eventually joined the Navy for shore duties and Lady Prince Smith showed her how to navigate the London underground which helped her in the trek to the south coast..

In conclusion Winnie had an abiding memory of a huge Chinese table on the black and white tiled floor in the hall. I wonder what happened to it?



Future events in the pipeline are a table top and refreshment afternoon on 14th September, an evening event (yet to be finalised) in October and, of course, the Christmas Fair.

"WHERE THE LIGHT GETS IN" by Lucy Dillon

When Betty, a patient in the hospice where Lorna works, dies and leaves her with the courage to go back to her home town and face her past, plus a nervous dachshund called Rudy, Lorna buys an art gallery and a new way of life.

This heart warming book is moving and thought-provoking with a love interest thrown in. Especially good for anyone with a love of dogs or knitting but, although I have no interest in either, I very much enjoyed the book!



"DEAR MRS BIRD" by A J Pierce

Set in London during WWII, this book is about Emmy, a would-be journalist, who inadvertently finds herself working for an agony aunt on a magazine. Mrs Bird doesn't like any form of "unpleasantness" and refuses to answer letters from women with sensitive problems. Emmy tries to help these women by replying herself but will she be found out?

The book also looks at her life as a volunteer at the fire brigade telephone exchange and her personal life with friend, Bunty. It is a funny but poignant book with heavy use of the "jolly hockey" sticks language of the time and I would recommend it.

Meet the people behind the brand who help produce Black Yak.....so they can also 'Be an Individual'. In the first of our people stories we would like to introduce you to Rupa!

Rupa is head of the finishing department, which is a very demanding and important role. She has worked with us for more than 8 years and intends to spend the rest of her working life with Black Yak. Before she worked with us Rupa did not have regular work, doing 'piece work' knitting.

Born in Banepa, Nepal (which is about 25 kilometres east of Kathmandu), 34 year old Rupa is married to Umesh who has been working at a garment factory in Qatar for the past two years.

Rupa and Umesh have a 12 year old son named Sho. He currently attends an English medium school, with his education being paid for by Black Yak. They also have a 21 year old niece named Amira who works as one of our senior managers.



In her spare time Rupas interests include cooking, which she is very good at! Black Yak guarantees work for our producers 12 months a year, even when the orders are reduced. Rupa also receives medical benefits from us and an additional festival bonus which is equivalent to one month's salary. Workers are also gifted items such as TV's or mobile phones, which is the equivalent to about 10% of their salary.
