Local Birds & Wildlife




Photo 1—Painted Lady Butterfly

At last the weather is cooling down so we have got out a bit more this last week. The hot weather has been too hot to go out, but it has been good for butterflies. We have seen a lot in our garden and on the reserves up to now, more than last year, so it was nice to see the Painted Lady Butterfly (Photo 1) – the first one we have seen this year. Another bonus of the hot weather is the amount of Grass Snakes seeing we have been this Tophill Low year

(Photo2), some days we have seen as many as 5 different snakes of different

ages and sizes. The Grass Snakes are completely harmless for those people that are a bit squeamish. They are probably more frightened of us than we are of them.

We have had some activity on our feeders with the birds bringing back their young to feed them but I think we have missed a lot - due to the hot weather they have been coming very early morning. We have managed to photograph a few birds but not

as many as we would normally get. We have mostly been getting Goldfinches (photo 3), a lot of Starlings feeding their young (photo 4) and the occasional Robin (photo 5). Other birds seen at the feeders are Chaffinches, Great Tits, Greenfinches, Blue Tits and Long Tailed Tits. House Sparrows have had a good breeding season Not seen many Blackbirds this time. Just a few Dunnocks (Hedge Sparrows) and occasional Tree Sparrow. The Coal Tits have

completely disappeared since early Spring, something we have never seen before as normally they are here all year around and quite a lot of them.

In the 1980s the garment industry in Nepal started to rapidly increase largely due to businesses in their southern neighbour, India, trying to get around quota limits in their own country by opening new factories in Nepal. This expansion of the garment industry did boost Nepal's economy. However, in 2004 the WTO agreement on global garment production expired and in 2005 an agreement to allow Nepal duty free access to the U.S. fell through. The economic aftermath of 9/11 in 2001 also negatively affected garment exports to the U.S. Until



2002 the US took 87% Nepal's garment exports. Now Europe, Canada. India and, increasingly, Japan make up about 90% of their garment In 2018 the exports. value of garment exports for Nepal hit a high despite having a lower volume than previous years. This change from high volume, low quality production to higher quality and lower volumes.

There is now a growing movement towards promoting ethical fashion and sustainable manufacturing practices within the industry. There is a growing focus on empowering local communities through garment production, particularly in the context of ethical and sustainable practices. Smaller scale producers are now using a range of raw materials including eco-friendly fibres such as stinging nettle, hemp, bamboo and banana fibres. We, at Black Yak, have recently renewed about twenty of our sewing machines in Nepal and rather than getting rid of them we have donated them and taken the machines and the machine tables to families in our knitters' main home village and a couple of neighbouring villages. It is increasingly difficult for people in villages remote from the capital city of Kathmandu to make a living from agriculture alone and most young people head off for the bright lights and factories in Kathmandu as soon as they can. It is our intention to promote small scale production of some garments in the villages that can be sold and can also be used as a training ground for those, young and old, who do want to start micro businesses
